

Spring Conference 2009: Directions to the Venue

By Car

Birmingham is well-signposted and surrounded by motorways, including the orbital M42 and the infamous Spaghetti Junction (Gravelly Hill Interchange). From the North of England you can use the M6, M1, M42 and A roads to get to Birmingham. From the East of England Birmingham is best accessed by the M6 while A-roads are the best route from the west of England. Birmingham can be accessed from the south of England using the M40, M42 and M5 motorways.

By Rail

Most cities and towns in England have excellent rail links with Birmingham. The main station in Birmingham is New Street, the other stations are Snow hill and Moor Street which Operate mainly to London. All three stations are located within the city centre. Timetables can be checked at [National Rail Enquiries](http://www.nationalrail.co.uk) (+44 8457 48 49 50) and booked on-line or over the 'phone through the train operator.

By Bus

There is a direct frequent coach service from major UK cities to Birmingham operated by National express. There is also well priced operator called mega bus that operates from places like London and Manchester. Unless clearly stated otherwise coaches terminate at Digbeth Coach Station. From the coach station, it is an easy ten-minute walk to the city centre.

Local Buses

There are 7 buses you can get from the city centre they are 2, 4, 6, 12, 31, 41 and 37. The journey from the city centre is a short 10 min journey. The Muath trust is clearly visible at the camp hill round about the first roundabout from the city centre.
